"A MOTHER IN HISTORY" by Jean Stafford. (Farrar, Straus & Giroux. \$3.95. 121 pp.) The title for this eerie interview was suggested by Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, mother of Lee Harvey Oswald, herself. Again and again in a three-day interview with the distinguished writer she referred to herself as "a mother in history," and once she avowed that she was "responsible for two Presidents." There were few other consistencies in her long, partly tape-recorded ramblings. For sometimes her son was innocent of the assassination of President Kennedy and she knew who had "framed" him and sometimes she was just as certain that he was an agent who had been chosen to do a mercy killing "for the security of the country." And if he had in fact killed did that make him a louse? It is not Miss Stafford's skill as a questioner that sets the story apart. Mrs. Oswald does not answer questions. She evades. But Miss Stafford has presented her non-sequiturs, her changes of mood, the twisted facts that underline her desperate fixation in such a way that comment is unnecessary.
