

Rome Questions Warren Report

VATICAN CITY, March 8 (UPD) — A Vatican newspaper said today the Warren Commission findings on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy are not convincing.

"Many questions were left without an answer," an editorial in the Vatican weekly *Osservatore Della Domenica* said.

The editorial, entitled "Uneasiness," surveyed the official government investigation and the current probe in New Orleans.

It said "the man in the street, at the sight of so much smoke, is led to believe something is really burning."

"The fact is that the Warren inquiry and the conclusions it reached at the time do not seem convincing," the editorial said.

The Vatican newspaper said

"since the day of the tragedy 15 persons believed involved in the murky affair have disappeared brusquely from the scene in circumstances that are, to say the least, abnormal."

"No one can claim to see clearly in this affair which troubles not just American public opinion," the editorial said.

The result was "an almost general feeling of uncertainty" about the events surrounding Kennedy's death, the editorial said.

The newspaper said these doubts were not usual in crime investigations, "but in this case it is a president of the United States."

(AP)—Attorneys for Clay

Shaw, the only man arrested so far in District Attorney Jim Garrison's probe of the John F. Kennedy assassination, are going to court in an attempt to quash the charges.

Guy Johnson, an attorney for the former managing director of the International Trade Mart, said motions would be filed today in the court of Criminal District Judge Bernard Bagert, who has already scheduled a preliminary hearing in the case for Tuesday.

"We will file motions for particulars—the nature of the

crime, the names of the co-conspirators, the name of the unnamed informant," Johnson said.

Garrison alleged in an application for a warrant to search Shaw's home last week that Shaw, Lee Harvey Oswald and David W. Ferrie met and discussed "how they would kill John F. Kennedy."

Shaw said he did not know Oswald, the man identified by the Warren Commission as Kennedy's assassin, or Ferrie, a free-lance pilot who died Feb. 22 while under investigation by Garrison's office.

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
