Meanwhile, in a separate development, the Government filed a brief in a Federal Court case that strongly implied that the Army had traced the route of documents stolen from military intelligénce commands in West Germany to member of the press and possibly Senate aides.

The brief was filed in a suit by the American Civil Liberties Union against Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger on behalf of American antiwar groups in West Germany. The original suit, filed last year, attempted to bar the Army from surveilling United States servicemen and civilians in West Germany.

"In fact, these leads were pursued by means of certain intelligence collection methods and procedures, resulting in confirmation of some of the information received earlier, the brief said.

The A.C.L.U. is expected to seek access to the documents now held by the judge. The Army has asked the judge to review the material in secret and to decide whether it is relevant to the case. If he decided to rule it was relevant. the Army brief said, the Sec-retary of Defense would then decide whether to label the material a matter of national security and attempt to exert material remain sealed.
