Sheridan, an investigator for the National Broadcasting Company, surrendered in New Orleans today on a charge that he had attempted to bribe or intimidate a witness in the investigation of an alleged conspiracy to assassinate President Kennedy.

Mr. Sheridan had flown from Washington to answer the charge, which was brought by District Attorney Jim Garrison of New Orleans.
