## Panel Studying Kennedy's Death Has Information on Fourth Shot

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Dec. 20 (UPI) — Representative Harold S. Sawyer, a member of the House Select Committee on Assassinations, said today that the panel had received "very disturbing" evidence indicating that shots were fired from more than one position when President Kennedy was killed on Nov. 22, 1963.

The Michigan Republican said tests on a tape recording made from the open microphone of a police motorcycle indicated "beyond a reasonable doubt" that a shot was fired from the grassy knoll in Dealey Plaza in Dallas..

In Washington, the panel met in executive session but sent out word that it would not comment on Mr. Sawyer's remarks. The committee has already rejected a similar tape as inconclusive because of possible echoes and background noise.

In September 1964, the Warren Commission releasedf a report concluding that Lée Harvey Oswald fired three shots from the Texas Schoolbook Depository Building across the plaza, and was solely responsible for the President's assassination.
