ABERNATHY PLANS A 'MASSIVE' MARCH

'Caravans' of Poor People From Across Nation Will Go to Capital in May

ATLANTA, April 21—The Poor People's Campaign, which had been planned by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., has been expanded to make it "the most massive and militant non-violent movement in history," Dr. King's successor said here today.

In an effort to insure national support for the campaign, the Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy said that it would be preceded by rallies and marches in cities and towns across the country.

Mr. Abernathy is Dr. King's successor as president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

In the Deep South, Mr. Abernathy said that a wagon train with mule-drawn carts would proceed from state to state, picking up the poor and taking them to Washington. He said that the wagon train would pass through Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia.

And in the North and Midwest, Mr. Abernathy said that there would be mass rallies in Boston and Chicago that would send off caravans from those Continued on Page 34, Column 4
