

Dr. King's Brother Sees Conspiracy

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The brother of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., says he believes there was a conspiracy in King's death.

"We feel there was a conspiracy," said the Rev. A. D. Williams King of Louisville, Ky.

He made the remark in an interview yesterday, and said he was not at liberty to discuss the matter.

A. D. King said he received a number of threatening telephone calls and letters after his brother's death, but said they have since tapered off.

He said the Poor People's March on Washington next month is a "real necessity. We plan to go ahead with it." The Midwest part of the march will come into Pittsburgh on May 16 and leave here for Washington.
