Dr<u>. King</u>'s Brother Sees Conspiracy

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The brother of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King-Jr., says he believes there was a conspiracy in King's death.

"We feel there was a conspiracy," said the <u>Rev. A. D.</u> Williams King of Louisville, Ky.

He made the remark in an interview yesterday, and said he was not at liberty to discuss the matter.

A. D. King said he received a number of threatening telephone calls and letters after his brother's death, but said they have since tapered off.

He said the Poor People's March on Washington next month is a "real necessity. We plan to go ahead with it." The Midwest part of the march will come into Pittsburgh on May 16 and leave here for Washington.
