# Kennedy Book Fight **Prompting Feelers** To Avoid Court Test 12/16/66

Efforts are under way to avoid a court fight in Mrs. John F. Kennedy's battle to prevent the publication of "Death of a Presilent," William Manchester's book on the assassination of her husband,

There were reports that Sentor Robert F. Kennedy was ager to avoid a public conrontation between Mrs. Kennely and Mr. Manchester, Harper z Row, Publishers, Inc., and look magazine, which plans to erialize the book.

Senator Kennedy, one reliable report said, had opposed Mrs. Kennedy when she decided last Friday to bring legal action. Mrs. Kennedy has stated that publication of the book violates 'accepted standards of propriety."

Senator Kennedy was said to believe that court action was mpractical, that it simply was lot worth the effort.

One source said that the Senator once had rejected a suggestion that he sue Mr. Manchester, and that this offered some indication of Mr. Kennedy's feelings.

However, a spokesman for the Kennedy family insisted that "there is an absolute identity of views between Bob and Mrs. Kennedy."
