## Warren dedicates Israeli memorial to Kennedy

New York Times News Service JERUSALEM (Israeli Sector) — A memorial to President Kennedy was dedicated in an informal atmosphere yesterday morning atop a barren but historic hill outside Jerusalem.

NEARLY 2,000 official guests, including many from the United States, were joined by hundreds of American students and tourists as well as throngs of Israelis in the small plaza facing the memorial.

".U.S. Chief Justice Earl Warren, whose enthusiasm for the dramatic memorial after he had seen it for the first time prompted him to redraft his dedicatory speech, praised the striking symbolism, a tree trunk representing untimely death.

He also said that the Kennedy peace forest which had been planted on the slopes of the memorial hill, now a part of the larger and older American peace forest, would have "greatly pleased" the young President.

"Something more than mere surmise justifies my statement," Warren said. He recalled Kennedy's words in a speech eight years ago when the then junior senator from Massachusetts told a Jewish National Fund meeting:

"What work could be more heartwarming or more enduring than the great forest at Jerusalem. Your children and grandchildren when they visit Israel will find your monument."
