## Miss Fromme Is Judged Competent to Stand Trial

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept.
23—A Federal judge ruled today that Lynette Alice Fromme
was mentally competent to
stand trial on a charge of attempting to assassinate President Ford here on Sept. 5.
The judge also granted Miss
Fromme's request to represent
herself.

The rulings by District Judge Thomas J. MacBride paved the way for the trial to start here Nov. 4. Miss Fromme waived a request she had made at an earlier court appearance to have the trial moved to another city.

The judge ruled after testimony by Dr. James R. Richmond, a psychiatrist, that he had examined Miss Fromme for an hour and 40 minutes and concluded that she was "mentally competent to understand the proceedings" and to cooperate in her defense.

Dr. Richmond also submitted a written report to the judge, which was shared with the United States Attorney's office and a Federal public defender, E. Richard Walker, who was

In her original court appearance before Judge MacBride, Miss Fromme, the first woman ever to be charged with an attempt to assassinate a United States President, called on the judge to have the Federal Government "take over the redwood trees."
