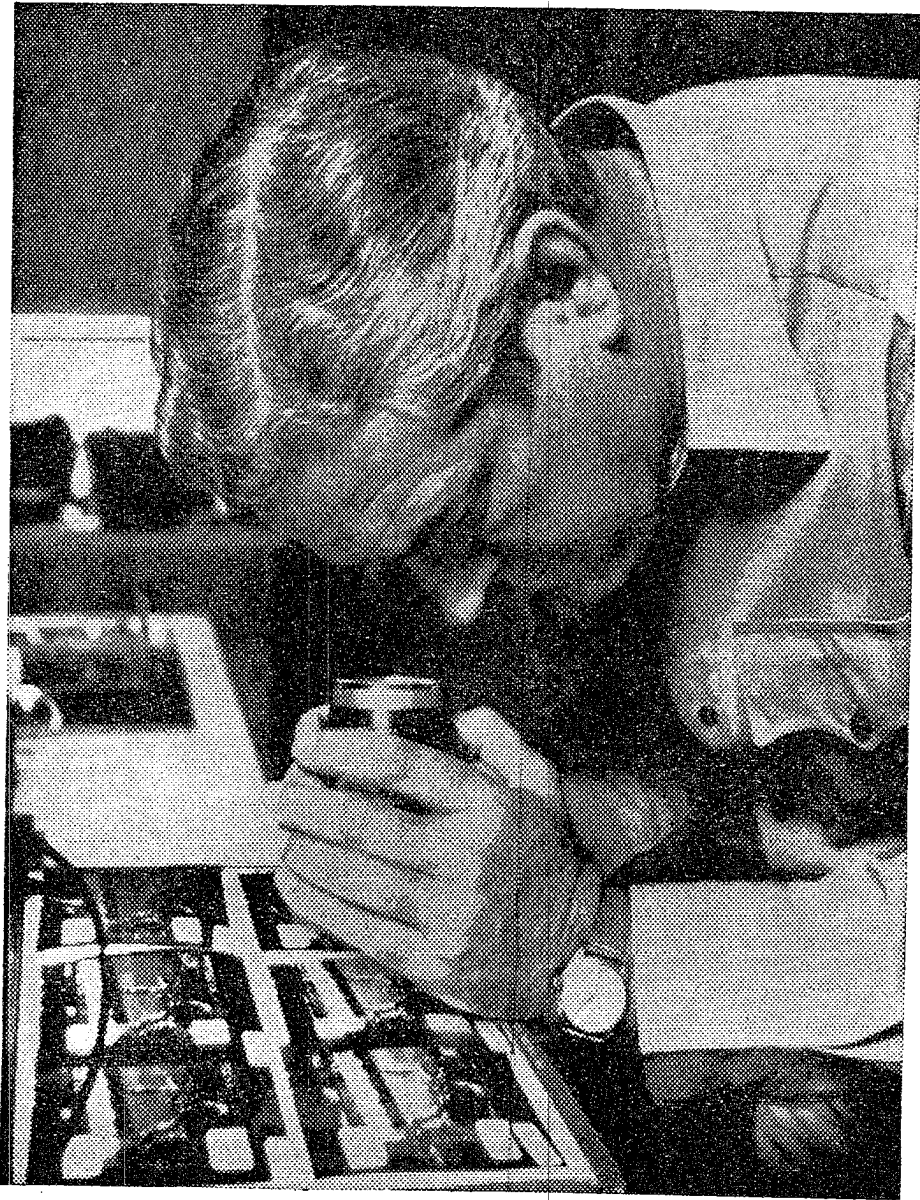


**Frame by frame,
Governor Connally reviewed

John Connally was able to study the pictures, one by one, under a magnifying glass. He believes, firmly, that he was hit at least nine frames (one-half second) later than the Warren Report says he was.

His comments, based on what the pictures show, cast reasonable doubt on the Commission's "single bullet" thesis. In this week's LIFE you can study these color pictures along with the Governor. He agreed to review these for LIFE because "history is bigger than anyone's feelings."

On the anniversary of this tragedy, on this Thanksgiving week, we take no great satisfaction in reviewing the circumstances of the assassination. But in the face of reasonable doubt—doubt that Oswald acted alone—the conclusion is clear: the case should be re-opened.
