

Allen-Scott Report Warren Panel Sifted 'Mr. X'

WASHINGTON — One of the most curious pieces of information uncovered by the Warren Commission during its investigation of President Kennedy's assassination was an extraordinary statement volunteered by a Russian.

This "Mr. X," seemingly nervous and uncasy, appeared unexpectedly at the U.S. embassy in Moscow some six months after the Dallas murder. To embassy officials, he claimed to have known Lee Harvey Oswald and his wife, Marina, when they lived in the Soviet.
