

FBI Files Reveal New Evidence in JFK

Shocking new evidence that JFK assassin Lee Harvey Oswald did not act alone has been uncovered by The ENQUIRER in recently released files.

And in an exclusive ENQUIRER interview, former Dallas police chief Jesse Curry has admitted — for the first time publicly — that he's long "had the feeling" a second gunman could have been involved.

A special team of ENQUIRER investigators spent a tremendous number of man-hours sifting through the 40,000 pages of once-secret FBI files . . . and among the startling facts they unearthed were these:

- Two days before the assassination, two men were seen sighting rifles at targets in a car near the murder scene.

- Three weeks before JFK's death, a Texas millionaire confided to pals that three oilmen had arranged to have the President slain in Dallas.

"The FBI files add even further to my long-standing conviction that the Warren Report was one enormous cover-up — a whitewash," declared Sylvia Meagher, an expert on the assassination.

The ENQUIRER took its findings to Curry, who was Dallas police chief at the time of the 1963 tragedy . . . and he admitted he has long suspected that Oswald wasn't the only one firing at Kennedy.

"I had the feeling (a second gunman may have been involved) but we could never prove it," said Curry.

The Warren Commission concluded Oswald had acted alone, firing three shots from a point behind the President's motorcade. But Curry gave these reasons for suspecting a second gunman may have been in front of JFK:

"The top of Kennedy's head was blown off and the blood and brains went to the left and rear of him. This was an indication the shot had come from the front."

Curry's "second gunman" suspicion is given added weight by the startling disclosure in FBI files that two gun-carrying strangers were seen near the murder scene just two days before Kennedy was shot down. Here's what the FBI's terse, teletyped report of that incident said:

"On November 20 last, the Dallas police sighted two unknown men sighting in a rifle

near scene of where President was later assassinated. Rifle being sighted in at two silhouette targets (in an) old model car seen in vicinity of men.

"Police circled to contact men and they disappeared."

Amazingly, police apparently did nothing else on that case — despite the fact that the President was already scheduled to drive through the area in just two days, said Sylvia Meagher.

"I found the report quite startling. Yet there's no apparent follow-up, which I think merits an investigation," said Miss Meagher, author of "Accessories After the Fact."

"The incredible thing is that the motorcade went ahead. There was no attempt to change the route, cancel the appearance, or even take special precautions like posting men on rooftops or seeing that all office building windows along the route were closed."

Mark Lane, author of a best-selling book on the assassination, "Rush to Judgment,"

commented: "The fact that the Dallas police saw two people sighting a rifle at a target in Dealey Plaza is an incredible statement."

"That incident is extremely significant . . . very important. Why have we never heard about it?"

FBI files also yielded further evidence of a conspiracy.

Three weeks before the assassination, a Texas millionaire confided to friends at a Dallas restaurant that the President would soon be murdered, reveals an FBI teletype message dated Nov. 26, 1963.

The message said the millionaire "was violently abusive about President Kennedy" and

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told his guests "that arrangements had been made to kill President Kennedy in Dallas. According to (the millionaire), three oilmen had the money to do the job and that money had been put up."

After JFK's assassination, one of the millionaire's dinner guests — businessman Roger Tittle — talked to the FBI about the alleged plot. Contacted by The ENQUIRER at his home in Cleburne, Texas, Tittle confirmed that the dinner conversation had taken place.

"When we heard that the President had been assassinated, that (dinner conversation) came flooding back and I felt I had to report it," he said.

But Tittle insisted he knows no further details of the plot — nor the names of those involved.

Commenting on the facts dug up by The ENQUIRER, Kennedy assassination expert Harold Weisberg said: "These new pieces of evidence strengthen even further my belief that the Warren Commission's report was nothing but a coverup.

"The President himself should personally take a hand in the investigation into the JFK assassination."
