Dear Mr Berkeley,

Herewith is the piece, conceived as a recasting of a letter to Vincent Salandria about his speech on the Kennedy assassination in October 1971 in Cambridge to the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, and about to be born in Computers and Automation, I hope, as a ninth-anniversary article on the assassination. It is, I think, shorter than the subject warrants, yet a little longer than intended.

Still, I could not include comment on the three installments of Soviet journalists Mikhail Sagatelyan's account of the assassination as they arrived after the writing of my piece was well advanced and would have required much recasting at greater length or with extreme condensation.

Yet I think Sagatelyan's account should not pass without close scrutiny. It is a particularly nasty piece of journalism. If it is agreeable to you, I should like to subject it to analysis for Computers and Automation. If you think this worthwhile would you send me the concluding installments of Sagatelyan's account beginning with the June 1972 issue of C&A. I shall be much obliged.
