Dear Mr. Sorensen,

Thank you for your letter of the 26th and enclosures. I do not mind having my address on the microfilm. I cannot think of any addendum or whatchacallit, since Impeach the Warren Commission is too derivative or preempted by the JBS...so, no epilogue. (I could put an apology for the many errors, but many of them were Scarecrow's and I have absolved myself for the remainder on grounds that I was doing the Index while working full-time and writing Accessories and handling a big traffic in mail and phonecalls from the critics and researchers.)

I'mglad you found another Willis, since you are collecting Willises. The Major (Phil Willis) is, I am told, a venal and nasty piece of goods.

I have no objection whatever to libraries disseminating the Subject Index, that is wright. In fact, since you seem to possess a thermofax, perhaps you would consider duplicating the Index for the odd or occasional request I still get, from sometimes desperate—sounding persons, and selling it to deserving cases. If you would consider this, I will screen my correspondence and send you the names and addresses of people who wrote asking for the Index after it went out of print.

If you and/or Mrs. Hartmann had the time or inclination, you could correct the errors in the published text (from the errata sheets), refine some of the classifications by adding sub-classifications, and expand the scope of the Index by incorporating the Commission Documents from the Archives. You could then seek a publisher for a new revised enlarged edition, as co-author(s). However, I suspect that this is the worst idea I've had since 11/22/63, so forget I mentioned it. Really—it is too wild, we would wind up hating each other. Anyhow, I think there would be little demand for it and no one would take the trouble to publish.

About the black ink: The plot thinkens, because I used the same pen exactly in both cases!

If ittturns out that TMO does not offend you, kindly do not hold me responsible. I make no guarantees...

Final item: Mrs. Hartmann's project looks excruciating to me. But useful, I am sure. It occurs to me that she might find useful a pair of lists I made up about two years ago. I have only one carbon copy (15 pages) and cannot remember what I did with the original and/or other copies. I will take my chances with the Post Office to the extent of mailing it to you so that if you or Mrs. Hartmann think it will serve some useful purpose, you can copy it and return the original to me, please, as it appears to be irreplaceable.
