I've been following your correspondence with continuing fascination. It has been most helpful to me. My failure to respond in kind has not been due to a lack of interest, I assure you; far from it, I have been devoting every spare minute of my time to the continuation of research along the lines we have discussed previously.

As you know, CBS News is preparing a two-hour documentary for the fall on the three successful and one unsuccessful assassinations . Hoping you will keep this confidential, I would like you to know that the producers have asked for permission to have their own forensic expert examine the autopsy photos and x-rays. I believe this is a tragic mistake for reasons I am not prepared to discuss in writing.

In addition, the producers have been talking with young Mr. Groden, another mistake. I would like to steer them away from the single-bullettheory and other such trivia.

Have you ever given any thought to the circumstances whereby Dr. B. ascended to the post of Physician to the President? I find the contemporary press clippings (July 1963) vague on this point. Dr. Travell never resigned and remained on the payroll, but the good doctor usurped her functions thereafter. The way the press learned of this development was by chance consultation of the Government Organizational Manual which was then newly published. There had been no press releases from the White House. I find it curious that a cardiologist-internist replaced a specialist in back ailments as physician to a President whose weakened back was one of his major medical difficulties.

Again, thank you for continuing to send me material.
