Josiah (Tink) Thompson, philosopher-writer is, at a young age, a foremost denizen of the world created in Dallas, Tex., on Nov. 22, 1963, when John F. Kennedy died and the bizarre world of cartilages, Zapruder frames, super-bullets, and trajectoris was born. For all that, Tink Thompson looks like a little boy in tweed whose innocence comes through in a soft-

His "micro-study of the Yesterday, Kennedy assassination.' "Six Seconds in Dallas" puts him right smack into a world populated by people such as Mark Lane. Thomas Buchanan, Harold Weisberg, and Jim Garrison, the push-button supersleuth from New Orleans. Perhaps his greatest virtue is that Tink Thompson succeeds in bringing a cool and intensely logical voice into this world of clamor.
