I had no recollection of having them, and no recollection of their contents. The reason, I suspect, is that my head got overstuffed with data at some past point, and I just stopped registering. Ray Marcus undoubtedly would scoff at such an "innocent" explanation and never believe that I was not as religiously familiar with his work and his discoveries as with my own; but I know that you will understand that there can be papers in my files of which I have no conscious recollection! In any case, when I wrote that I had not seen the Julia Mercer documents until seeing the published copy of Six Seconds, it was in good faith, although I now realize that you must have given me the CDs long before that.
