This is just a quick note to thank you for your letter of the 5 th and to tell you that I have asked my pubiishers to send you a reviem copy of Accessories after the Fact, in view of the fact that you are writing in Open City, which you can of course keep.

Events are roving so rapidly that I find myself imundated and far behind in all my work, in my job and in my after-hours "essassinations" work. The murder of nobert Kennedy, the funeral which I nor watching on the screen in front of the typerriter, the bulletin on the capture of James Barl Ray-these new shocks and horrors heve kept ny phone ringing constantly, and mail is beginning to come in, and i have spent literally about seven hours solely on informing people by phone of the latest feat of that bird of prey and foul self-prowoter, Kark Lane.
