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On June 16, 1964, the President's Commission requested information concerning a United Press International or Associated Press news release on or about November 26, 1963, where it was reported that General EDWIN A. WALKER was flying the American flag upside down in front of his residence on the day of the assassination. This request was in connection with a witness, ROBERT A. SURREY, who was, at that time, testifying before the President's Commission.

On June 16, 1964, EDDIE BARKER, News Manager, KRLD-TV & Radio, Dallas, Texas, advised SA IVAN D. LEE that ADLAI STEVENSON gave a speech in Dallas on the night of October 24, 1963, and on October 25, 1963, one of General WALKER's aides, name unknown, called BARKER, and stated that General WALKER was flying three American Flags upside down on his front lawn as Dallas was a city in distress.

Mr. BARKER advised he would not give publicity to this act and the unknown aide of General WALKER called him numerous times during the following three days. Mr. BARKER stated that on Monday, October 28, 1963, United Press ran a picture on their wire of the flags being flown upside down at the residence of General WALKER. Mr. BARKER stated he received a call from the Columbia Broadcasting System, with which KRLD is affiliated, and that the Columbia Broadcasting System requested Mr. BARKER to take some television film of an interview with General WALKER, in which film interview the American Flag being flown upside down would be depicted.

Mr. BARKER stated he went to the WALKER residence and, when he requested General WALKER, to stand beside the American Flags during the interview, General WALKER went into a raving rage, got into his car, and drove off. Mr. BARKER stated he did not conduct an interview nor did he take any pictures. To Mr. BARKER's recollection, the American Flags were flown upside down at WALKER's residence for approximately five days.
