Under the circumstances that pravail during the General Assembly, I may never even lay eyes on him by the time we adjourn, around the third week of December. And, indeed, just what good would it do me if I did have an opportunity to approach him? Considering the dismal experiences we have all had with other WC lawyers, it is not promising.

No news otherwise. I did not know that Tink Thompson had made his films or photos available. As you may know, he is on a fellowship in Denmark and will not be back in this country for another year.

About Bob Ockene—I am heartsick to tell you that he developed chronic leukemis, almost a year ago, and has been quite ill much of the time with hepatitis produced by transfusions.
