Wrote first/books not in support of official accounts of assassinations  
of President John F. Kennedy of Martin Luther King, Jr. Still used as college  
texts.

Filed a dozen Freedom of Information lawsuits to bring suppressed official  
information to light, obtaining a third of a million pages. Some suits prece-  
dental and one was cited as requiring amending <sup>when</sup> the law was amended in 1974.

Department of Justice told federal court he knew more about the Kennedy  
assassination and its investigations than anyone working for the FBI.

Was consulted by six committees of both houses of Congress.

Twice a consultant for the Department of Justice.

When a reporter for the Wilmington Morning News ~~working on~~ covering a hurri-  
cane (in the early 1930s) made it possible for <sup>its and Philadelphia Bulletin's</sup> the correspondent in Salisbury  
to win the Pulitzer prize.

Investigative reporting of Nazi cartels before Pearl Harbor followed by  
some of them being taken over by the United States government.

Was editor and investigator for the United States Senate.

<sup>Investigative</sup>  
Analyst and trouble shooter for the wartime Office of Strategic Services.

In junior year at old Wilmington High School edited the paper, the News, and  
won All-America Honor Rating at Columbia School of Journalism.

(And National Barbecue King in 1959!)
