There has been no Christmas joy for me from PN pumeruant to yourk letter of 10/15 and my response.

If there has been a mention of WHITEWASH IV: TOP SECRET J.P.K.ASSASSINATION transcript in FW it is the first time no single brokstore has mentioned it. If there has been no mention, this is the first time FW has ignored the country's smallest and most specialised publisher.

You should have redeived a copy long age. A glance would, I believe, have shown the uniqueness of the content.

As has happened with each of the books I have published myself, this one received major news attention, leading, I am sure, to book saller and buyer frustration. The Washington Post syndicated a major-length story. AF and UFI did the same on their A wires. Play of which I know ranged up to more than 40 inches on the front page of the Sacramento, Ca., Beg. There has been similar attention abroad, ranging from phone broadcasts to Honolulu to a major story in the International Hemila Tribung and a full column syndicated to a dozen papers in the Metharlands. And I can't begin to tell you the number of self-generated radio broadcasts domestically, all by phone.

But also! almost nobody knows how to get the book. To read or to sell.

Except from these radio broadcasts. In the first two yeeks we had already received enough checks to pay off 20% of what we berroed to pay the printer.

Such a book with such a record is not trade news to PW? I'm sorely disappointed at that, too. Major publishers have large and expensive staffs and often don't begin to get this kind of news attention to non-fiction. Yet what I report was accomplished with an advertising and promotion budget of zero - not a penny.

As I suggested in my first letter on this book, referred to Albert Johnson, I believe major publishers can learn for a very small one.

We are getting out a mailing after Xmas. From it I learn that with the earlier books that PW did mention 672 books stores and libraries ordered from us, about 400 of these stores. You did serve an industry purpose. I believe.

Mr. Johnson remembered reviewing (very favorably) one of my books brought out by a subsidiary of a major publisher. It was major news but received almost no newspaper or radio attention and is by far my poorest seller. (I have the remainders.) Mr. obmson may be interested in knowing that based on that book and my subsequent work, including investigation, and the legal work of my colleague in this new book, a federal court is new considering ordering a trial for James Barl Ray and the Supreme Court is considering whether to grant certifrari to the State of Tennessee, which is appealing a new legal precedent we have established in this came. If you do not want the copy I sent you, would you please give it to Mr. Johnson? If you do not want the a label to mean he would like one, whether or not to review.
