Dear Mr. Weisberg,

I have received all the books I ordered. Thank you. I have already read parts of all of them. I note that you sent me a refund check, but I do not intend to cash it. Consider it a handling charge. You should be careful, your check has your phone number! I would like to call you sometime, but only with your permission.

Senator Cooper died about a year ago. He was in poor health. Very little was everwritten in Kentucky about Cooper's service on the Warren Commission, at least in newspapers and local magazines. I have heard of "Whitewash" for years, but even in underground bookstores and our large Louisville independent bookstore, Hawley-Cooke, I never saw a copy of your books until I wrote you.

I intend to go look at Cooper's papers at UK in Lexington soon, and I'll look for the copy of Whitewash you sent him. If you have any thing you would like for me to look for, let me know.

I bet it was interesting for you to work on the Bloody Harlan prosecution. I am from Eastern Kentucky, where my father was a branch manager of the local Caterpillar dealer. It is a unique area, much misunderstood. I went to a Catholic school in Corbin, St. Camillus Academy. I'll never forget how proud the nuns were when Kennedy was elected, and how devastated they were when he

was killed. I was only nine, but even today the strength of the emotions at that time were incredible. Kentucky was considered somewhat anti-Catholic at that time, except for the Ohio Valley. I think the nuns are the reason today that I am so fascinated by the Kennedy administration. Economist Walter Heller is the only member of the Kennedy administration I ever met, but to me his economic policies were progressive even today, compared to some of the clowns that masquerade as modern economists.

Some observations. I have Accessories After the Fact, and it is excellent. I also have Seth Kantor's reissue on Ruby in Dallas, which is good and similar to your Oswald in New Orleans.

I presume the one used on "The Men Who Killed Kennedy" is one that Robert Groden supplied, but I have no way of knowing this for a fact. The one I purchased does have better color.

Recently I saw a show, I believe "Eyewitness Video". Bob Pettit and others were interviewed about the Ruby shooting. Thisvideo shows a unique view over Ruby's shoulder that I had never seen before. In it, Oswald clearly looks right at Ruby, in a sly way. I had read that Oswald showed a hint of recognition to Ruby, but until this view, I could not see it. It is chilling.
