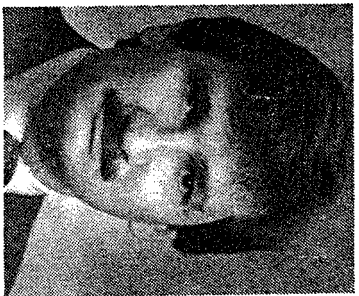

LBA board approves Intellectual Property Section proposal

At its May meeting, the LBA Board of Directors approved a request from the Intellectual Property Section to submit a notice to the Commonwealth's Secretary of State's Office. For the past several months, the LBA Intellectual Property Section has been discussing problems caused by the registration and use of Trade names which conflict with trademarks and service marks. The section members agreed that there is a perception that reservation of a corporate or assumed name confers substantive rights in the name, notwithstanding trademark or service mark rights.

In accordance with their belief, the section drafted the following notice which it will present to the Secretary of State: *The reservation or registration of a name, or incorporation under a name, does not in itself preclude others from using that name or a similar name in Kentucky. The right to use a name in connection with a business or commercial enterprise is governed by the principles of the laws of trademarks, service marks and unfair competition.*

Our determination that a name is "distinguishable upon the records" of the Secretary of State and otherwise acceptable as a corporate name, assumed name or the name of a limited partnership in Kentucky does not authorize the use of such names in contravention of pre-existing rights of another in a trademark, service mark or trade name. The Secretary of State does not consider federal or state registrations of trademarks and service marks or pre-existing rights of others in a name not of record in Kentucky in determining whether a corporate name, assumed name or the name of a limited partnership is available. ■

Louisville attorney donates books to UK library

Louisville attorney Bill Neichter recently donated two sets of books about the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. The books were written by former newspaper reporter and U.S. Senate investigator, Harold Weisberg. "Many books on JFK's murder are speculation and fiction. Harold Weisberg is the most well-documented and factual researcher I have seen," says Neichter. Weisberg's books are based on some 30 years of research and contain a number of citations from the Warren Report exhibits. ■
