This is in reply to your letter of August 30, 1972.

Dy our lotter to you dated December 8, 1970, we advised you then the "mandrander of transfer" to which your present letter refers was withheld from public examination under the terms of 5 U.S.C. 552(t) (6), "personnel and modical files and mimilar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy . . . " Unfortunately, that letter may have implied that the release of the document in question came within the discretion of the General Services Administration. If so, we would now like to clarify our position with regard to the "memorandum of transfer" as we have in other correspondence with rejord to other similarly citanted Hennedy assessination material.

It has been the stated desire of the Kennedy Family Representative, Mr. Burke Marshall, that the "memorandum of transfer" document not be included among those materials transferred to the National Archives, access to which would be governed by the Government. As of our latest communication, he has repeatedly denied requests for access to this document. Therefore, the General Services Administration is obliged to follow his direction in withholding the "memorandum of transfer" from public inspection.

The copy of the "memorandum of transfer" which is included among records accessioned from the Secret Service is governed by the restrictions placed upon the original by the Kennedy Family Representative.
