## 1. References:

- a. Letter, IACI-CAF, this office, dated 21 June 1977, subject as above forwarding a three page Army-originated report and a one page Navy report containing Army-originated information.
- b. Your letter, dated 22 June 1977, outlining your recommendations and suggestions concerning investigative records and their disposition. This letter was received on 27 June 1977.
- c. Your letter, dated 23 June 1977, requesting additional information concerning documents forwarded to you by Reference a. This letter was received on 27 June 1977.
- 2. With regard to your question concerning the "921" notations on page one of the three page Army-originated report, this office is unable to determine any meaning to these numbers. It is presumed that they refer to an internal routing system at the originating agency, which in this instance is The US Continental Army Command, Fort Monroe, Virginia, a unit which is no longer in existence. As you are aware, documents would be routed to specific individuals in any given office, and such individuals customarily initial in the space provided, to indicate that they have read the document.
- 3. With regard to your question concerning sources, recorded on page 2, of the Army-originated documents, please be advised that this is not a code, but rather abbreviations, as follows:
- a. DCSI, US CONARC Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence, United States Continental Army Command.
- b. G2, Fifth US Army Assistant Chief of Staff, G2, Fifth United States Army.
  - c. Press Newspaper articles.

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4. As previously indicated to you, there is no record of an Army Personnel Security Investigative File concerning you at this agency. You note in your letter that you were given a clearance to handle classified information for assignment to OSS. It follows therefore that if any investigation was conducted by the Army, it would have been routinely destroyed in accordance with Change 6, AR 340-18-5 which directs this disposition of all favorable investigations.
