

Reference to Jewry as "another International":

In the examination of Henry D. Allen on the afternoon of August 23, 1939, in vol. 6 on p. 4152 and 4157.

Dies and the "Jewish question";

The following extract is from the very end of the examination of Henry D. Allen on the afternoon of August 22, 1939 and appears in vol. 6 on p. 4044. Allen has said "that Jews in the Federal government are wrecking the country".

Mr. Mason. Are wrecking the country because you feel they are communistically inclined?

Mr. Allen. Not necessarily; no.

Mr. Mason. But you feel that, regardless they are Communists or not, if they have an active part in the official life of the government they will wreck the Government?

Mr. Allen. We can see in the Jews in the present Government, in the Roosevelt administration, the carrying out of the Proctocol Plan, if you know what that is.

Mr. Mason. Of course, I have heard what that is, but I know personally many Jewish people not only in the Federal Government but in the local and State governments that make excellent officials, and they/certainly not wrecking the Government.
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Mr. Allen. The exception probably proves the rule.

The Chairman. That is a question that neither this committee nor any other committee can ever solve with respect to the Jewish ~~people~~ race.

(Thereupon the committee adjourned to meet tomorrow, Wednesday, August 23, 1939, at 10 a.m.)

Re. Whitley's resignation:

Revealed by Marcan-tonio on floor on February 2. Starnes refused to comment, UP says (News) by Stripling said that "Whitley had asked not to continue as counsel after the committee's authority expired".

Washington Post of 2/28/40 says that the committee announced on 2/27 that it had "reached no decision on employment of counsel "" to succeed Whitley. There seems to have been no formal announcement of Whitley's resignation to date.
