

Tshombe Says Congo Has Enough

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo — Premier Moise Tshombe said Sunday his government would not appeal for foreign troops to help put down the spreading wave of rebellion in the Congo. Tshombe told a news conference "we have no need for troops from outside. We have plenty of our own soldiers who can handle the situation. All we need is equipment." The premier's declaration followed days of political and diplomatic activity in which pressure has been building up for foreign military intervention here. The United States, among others, is known to feel that

the Congolese army is incapable of putting down the revolts alone. It believes additional equipment would be wasted unless some foreign troops are brought in.

The U. S. is believed to have brought pressure on Belgium to supply some of the needed personnel during Belgian-American talks in Brussels last week. Belgium is reported to have refused, but it has suggested that Tshombe appeal for help from other African states.
