

U. S. Plotted Turk Attacks, Red Says

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MOSCOW — Premier Khrushchev warned Turkey Sunday that it could not drop bombs on Cyprus "with impunity."

He charged that Turkey could not alone have embarked on the "dangerous military gamble" of attacking Cyprus but that the attack was part of an "imperialistic plot" led by Washington and London and directed against Nicosia.

The premier's warning was part of a speech he made at Frunze, the capital of Kirghizia in the central Asian part of the Soviet Union.

The premier also charged the United States was assuming the role of "international gendarme" in many parts of the world.

"Imperialist forces" in America were using this role as a cover for their "attacks" on North Viet Nam and for "waging an undeclared war against the people of South Viet Nam," he

said.

In Laos, Khrushchev added, "American imperialism" was taking the side of reactionaries against the "democratic forces of the Laotian people."

His remarks on Cyprus Sunday echoed a Soviet government statement issued Saturday. The statement pledged the Soviet Union would help Cyprus to defend its freedom and independence if a foreign armed intervention of the island took place.

The premier Sunday warned that the Soviet Union could "not remain indifferent to the threat of an armed conflict" near its southern border.

"We are neighbors and we have done much to establish good relations with Turkey," the premier said.

He added that the Soviet Union wanted to see "peace and tranquility" established in the region south of its southern border.
