The World Telegram of August 17 (1 1/2 inches), evidentally referring to the 60 "leaders" of Frey's testimony; this UP Pittsburgh story; "The Steel Workers Organizing Committee, steel affiliate of the Committee for Industrial Organization, today declared that 21 of the 31 alleged Communists named by John P. Frey as being employed by the S.W.O.C. were never on the S.W.O.C. payroll."

The Daily Worker of August 17, 1938, Neil Brant, international representative, United Radio, Electrical and Mchine Workers, District 4; John Doherty, regional director, SWOC, St. Louis, Mo. ("ridiculous"); Robert Logaden, secy, local of the UREMW, St. Louis; Allan S. CIO News, 8/20/38, Len De Caux's column, calls Frey's testimony "fantasy" and points out that his list includes Republicans, Democrats and Socialists; traces some of material to Chicago Trihune; says Frey listed AFL State Federation President; Henry Fleisher wrote of the list,"It included the names of a number of Communists or labor journalists, teachers, and attorney's who have no connection with the CIO"; "It included a number of/organizations which do not exist in addition to the names of some CIO officials who are easily identified as being hostile to the Communist Party and its philosophy." Says men were listed bankans as Communists by Frey because "there are those who say he is", "suspected" of, or "associated". with, etc. Two Catholic priests, of Pittsburgh, sent telegraphic protest to Dies re Brophy, saying he was "thoroughly and enlightenedly Catholic in philosophy and action". They are Revs. C.O. Rice and C.P. Hensler.
