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# 'Hitler Tactics' in F. B. I., Norris Blasts at Jackson

Sen. George W. Norris (Ind., Neb.) today renewed his attack on the Federal Bureau of Investigation with a charge of tactics used "under Hitler, Stalin and Mussolini."

Sen. Norris declared F.B.I. agents have applied third degree methods—handcuffed, chained, stripped and searched, and frightened half to death—men who were "not offensive criminals," but who sought only to enlist soldiers for the Spanish Loyalists.

He told reporters that Justice Department agents "ignored the admitted facts" in absolving G-men of charges that they violated civil rights of 12 persons arrested in Detroit

and Milwaukee as suspected Communists. Atty. Gen. Jackson announced Saturday night that an investigation by Henry Schweinhaut, head of the department's Civil Liberties Division, convinced him the Detroit and Milwaukee agents "acted within their instructions and exercised their discretion in good faith."

Displaying some of the fire that made him famous as one of the Senate's outstanding liberals, Sen. Norris angrily denounced Mr. Jackson's report and said he was "very much disappointed."

But he clung to his faith in Mr. Jackson's ability and said he has not altered his opinion that Mr. Jackson is qualified for the presidency.

The Detroit-Milwaukee arrests were ordered by former Atty. Gen. Murphy shortly before he was elevated to the Supreme Court. One of Mr. Jackson's first acts after he succeeded Mr. Murphy was to drop the indictments which he defended, violated "even-handed" justice.
