

JUDGE IN SHAW CASE CAUTIONS NEWSMEN

NEW ORLEANS, June 21 (AP) — A Louisiana judge accused unnamed individuals today of "deplorable and contemptuous" disregard of court guidelines on pretrial publicity in the presidential conspiracy case against Clay L. Shaw.

Judge Edward Haggerty of Criminal District Court called newsmen into his office and issued a brief statement in which he warned: "I have kept and am keeping a full file on all violations of the orders issued by this court."

Judge Haggerty's statement followed by two days a Na-

tional Broadcasting Company television program that was critical of District Attorney Jim Garrison's case against Mr. Shaw, a 54-year-old retired businessman accused of conspiracy to murder President Kennedy.

Following Mr. Shaw's indictment, Judge Haggerty issued a list of guidelines that forbade court attaches, lawyers, witnesses and other connected with the case to discuss Mr. Shaw's guilt or innocence or "to make any statements concerning any evidence either for or against him."

Judge Haggerty declined to answer questions after reading his statement, in which he said: "The conduct of some persons has been deplorable and con-

temptuous of the court's orders. Persons including lawyers have acted at their peril."

He did not identify the persons to whom he referred. He said that after Mr. Shaw's trial he would determine if anyone should be cited for contempt for violations of his guidelines.
