

Warren Satisfied With Conclusions In Kennedy Report

LIMA, Peru, March 3 (UPI) — Chief Justice Earl Warren said today that he knew of not one single fact that might change the conclusions of the Warren Commission report on the assassination of President Kennedy.

Facing what he called his largest news conference since leaving politics 14 years ago, the Chief Justice insisted that he was personally satisfied with the conclusions of the Warren Report. The report identified Lee Harvey Oswald, acting alone, as Mr. Kennedy's assassin.

Mr. Warren refused comment on the investigation in New Orleans by District Attorney Jim Garrison because of his "absolute lack of information" about it. He said he did not know Mr. Garrison, had never heard from him in connection with the assassination, and was not well acquainted with the most recent developments because of his absence from the United States.

The Chief Justice said, however, that if any new evidence were uncovered it should be examined and "law permitted to follow its course."

Mr. Warren and his wife are on a private tour of Latin America.

Responding to questions from newsmen who filled the auditorium in the United States Embassy, Mr. Warren said he did not believe that revision of the Warren Report or a new investigation was warranted on the basis of the present known facts.

"Nobody is more interested in truth than myself. Nobody should be afraid of the truth," he responded calmly to questions about the assassination.
