New Witness Alleges That He Was Offered Money

A man who once operated a Turkish bath in New Orleans says that District Attorney Jim Carrison and his representatives offered him money if he could remember that Clay L. Shaw also used the name Clay Bertrand and that Mr. Shaw fregirented his establishment with a young man named 'Lee.'
The man, Fred Leemans,

who now lives in Slidell, La., near New Orleans, says he told the district attorney and his investigators that he would need \$2,500 to lease a building in New Orleans to "make a fine night club and a private club."

He says he was told they were sure he "would get it . . . people that helped him [Mr. Garrison] he took care of."

Mr. Leemans made his statements in a filmed interview for a program by the National Broadcasting Company.
