The Johnson staff assumed that Judge Hughes would take a Bible with her to the White House plane, then parked at Love Field in Dallas. She did not.

Judge Hughes boarded the plane at exactly 2:30 p.m. (CST). By then, it was too late for her to go back and return with a Bible, as she offered to do. > Some months later, Malcolm Kilduff, then an associate White House press secretary, was asked to locate the "Bible." Kilduff, one of the 27 persons in the compartment during the oath-taking, had held a tape-recorder microphone for Judge Hughes and the new President.

After Kilduff's preliminary inquiries proved unsuccessful, he telephoned Judge Hughes in Dallas. She told him she handed it to "someone . . . I thought he was a security man" before she left the plane
