Ousted State Dept. Aides Are Identified

Ten Were Accused Of Being Disloyal

By JAMES WALTER

Shielded by the State department without apparent cause for nearly three months, identities of the 10 State employes fired last June for suspected disloyalty to the United States were revealed to this newspaper last night by another high government source.

Several of the group were discharged because of their known association with agents of the Soviet Union. All involved were discharged summarily and have no right of appeal to the department or to the civil service commission.

Had Responsible Jobs

While none of the 10 was a career employe, all held responsible jobs in the intelligence and economics divisions. Some had received salaries as high as \$8,500 and \$9,000 a year as chiefs or assistants chiefs of section. Others were in salary brackets ranging down to \$3.200.

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
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

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Stripling Recalls **Baring Forgeries Used Against Quiz**

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RECALLS FORGERIES ... ROBERT E STRIP-LING former Chief Investigator of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, as he talks with a reporter. In his fifth article today Stripling recalls how he exposed as forgeries letters designed to smear the committee.

Ben Frank E Hock (D. Mich.) rose one day in Congress early in January, 1940, and brandished several photostat



Not much later in 1940, President Roosevelt called Dies to the White House from his home in Texas and, for one perhaps thoughtless moment, the Texan believed he had been returned to the good graces of the Ohief Executive.

I accompanied him to the White House. Dies honestly expected to be ushered into the President's study immediately but he was kept waiting for 45 minutes. And when the door of the study opened the man who emerged was Gardner Jackson

The President told Dies that Attorney General Robert Jackson was strenuously assusing the Committee of premature exposures that imperiled national security. The truth of the matter was that the Committee was taking an aggressive lead in matters in which the Justice Department was plainly negligent.

F.D.R. Gives Dies a Lecture

Roosevelt lectured Dies at length, and the Chairman reluctantly agreed to clear all future hearings with the Attorney General. "Dies agreed, he told us," . . . "purely because of the international situation.

Quietly, and I balieve quite efficiently, we continued our long inquiry into Japanese spying along the Pacific Coast and in Hawaii. By the middle of June, 1941, our case was com-


Dies, then in Jasper, Tex., Informed the Justice Department that he planned to begin bearings on the Japanese case on July 1. He outlined what we had discovered.


The Justice Department's reply came a few de scheduled opening of our hearings. It was signed by Acting Attorney General Matthew McGuire and informed Dies that the Department, after discussing the question with the President and Secretary Hull, could not give us permission to hold such hearings.

For the remainder of my life I will always believe that our disclosures would have aroused enough alarm among the people to have caused the Japanese to abandon their planned attack on Pearl Harbor.

If Pearl Harbor could not have been prevented, then I believe our disclosures would have prepared America more adequately for the difficult days ahead.

HAROND WEISBERG, 2322 N. Mottingham, Arlington, Virginia, was interviewed and furnished the following signed statement:

*March 18, 1948
At Arlington, Va.

Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice.

"I remember David Mayne from about 1939 or 1940. He told me he was an employee of William Dudly Pelley, of the Silver Shirts. He sold me a number of documents which later turned out to be spurious, as was established in court.

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
This statement is being retained in the files of the Washington Field Office. In addition to the above statement, WEISBERG advised that he did not feel that he was in possession of sufficient facts concerning MAYME to pass judgment on his loyalty and he felt that if snything were wrong with MAYME, it would probably be the indication that he needed psychiatric treatment. When questioned regarding his previous experiences with MAYME in semmetion with the House Committee on Un-American Activities, WEISBERG stated that this information was a matter of public record and that he did not care to discuss it further. WEISBERG advised that he would appear before the leyalty board if it was absolutely necessary but that he would not be able to testify to anything that was not already a matter of public record.

In a provious investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation in connection with MAYES, information was developed to the effect that he began negotiations with HARDLY WELDERG for delivery of letters which he claimed would expose the WILLIAN MUREY PELLY organization Cilvershirt Legion of America) and its relations

with the House Committee on Un American Affairs. These negotiations continued until December 7, 1939 and subsequent to this, MAYNE offered WEISBERG what he claimed to be additional original correspondence purporting to bear the signatures of PELLEY and containing references to Congressman DIES. An affidavit listing nine such letters purporting to contain authentic signatures of PELLEY and other documents, including a letter on the letterhead of "The Silvershirt Legion of America", dated at Boston, Massachusetts on July 22, 1938, purporting to bear the signature of PELLEY, was executed by MAYNE before a notary public on January 12, 1940. This affidavit and other documents were delivered to WEISBERG for various sums totaling \$107.


In examination by the FBI Technical Laboratory established the identities of the typewriters used in forging the above mentioned documenter. The facts surrounding the violation in this case were presented to the United States Grand Jury for the District of Columbia from April 29 through May 3, 1940. The Grand Jury returned an indictment on May 14, 1940, charging MAINE with obtaining money under false pretenses on one indictment, and two indictments charging him with forgery. A bench warrant was issued for MAINE's arrest on May 14, 1940 in Washington, D. C. On January 27, 1941, MAINE entered a plea of guilty to the indictment charging forgery and uttering and one charge of false pretense. On February 12, 1941 MAINE was sentenced to serve one to three years, which sentence was suspended and he was placed on probation for the same period of time.




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

HAROLD WEISBERG voluntarily appeared at the Washington Field Office of the FBI on February 14, 1940, at which time WEISBERG stated that MAYNE was identified to him (WEISBERG) by HENSHAW as being the Washington representative of the Silver Shirt Legion.

The Silver Shirt Legion of America, Incorporated, was named by the Attorney General as within the purview of Executive Order 9835.



It is noted that the above-named DAVID MAYNE later became associated with WILLIAM DUDLEY PELLEY and was convicted on February 12, 1941, in Washington, D. C., en a charge of fergery. MAYNE had been implicated in selling forged correspondence, reportedly signed by PELLEY, which had for its purpose the implication of members of the DIES Committee in such a way as to forestall the investigation of the PELLEY Group by the DIES Committee.



Records of the House Committee on Un-American Activities reflect a DIES Committee press release dated January 30, 1940, on page three of which it was reflected that the Committee had issued a subpoena to one JOHN MITCHELL HENSHAW to appear before it. A DIES Committee press release dated January 31, 1940, reflected the testimony taken from JOHN MITCHELL HENSHAW, HAROLD WEISBERG and GARDNER JACKSON corroborated testimony of DAVID MAYNE to the effect that he met HAROLD WEISBERG through the medium of HENSHAW and that WEISBERG was acting as an agent or collaborator with GARDNER JACKSON in the preparation and dissemination of statements and articles used by Congressman HOOK for the purpose of discrediting Chairman DIES and destroying the effectiveness of the Committee, and if possible, to prevent the continuance of the Committee. This press release further reflected that testimony from all the witnesses, who had knowledge of the facts, showed conclusively that the statements used in Congressman HOOK's address, which he inserted in the Record, were obtained following payment of consideration.

By reference from your office, I talked to Mr. H. Maurice Nouce of the Professional Staff of the Senate Committee on Appropriations. Mr. Joyce presented the attached letter, addressed to you by Senator Ball, from which you will note that Senator Ball desires the Eureau to furnish to his committee any "additional material concerning the activities of the 11 individuals which is on file in your department". will be observed that Senator Ball's letter, dated December 10th relates to the 11 persons who were removed from the State Depart ment under the provisions of the McCarran rider and that the Senator contemplates holding open hearings upon this matter.

I inquired of Mr. Joyce for a little more details in this situation and he stated Senator Ball and Senator Bridges desire to hold open public hearings concerning the 11 persons dismissed by the State Department. Joyce stated that committee investigators have reviewed the State Department files relating to these 11 individuals and that while some of the files contained Bureau reports, there were other indications in the State Department files that the FBI had information in addition to that contained in the State Department files. I inquired of Mr. Joyce as to the nature of these indications and he stated that frankly, and off the record, it appeared that information and reports which the Bureau furnished were not incorporated in the from time to time to Mr. regular files of the State Department but had been maintained in a separate category. Mr. Joyce stated, however, that there were various references in the files reviewed by the committee to Minformation from the FBI#.

I explained to Mr. Joyce that you were precluded by Departmental regulation from furnishing material direct to senatorial or Congressional committees. I outlined to him the Departmental regulation which required you to refer all requests for assistance or information to the Attorney General and pointed out that the Attorney General, through Departmental officials, customarily dealt direct with the Congressional committees. Mr. Jouce stated that Senator Ball and Senator Bridges were very anxious to "expose" the situation within the State Department and he recalled that the committee had last June been most vigorous in its interrogation of Secretary of State Marshall, and others.



to advise us in detail exactly what action the Attorney General wanted taken in this situation.

Mr. Joyce indicated that the concern of the committee was basically over the fact that the McCarran rider was rendered completely ineffective if its terms were utilized to fire an employee who, after he hired a lawyer, was then permitted to effect a so-called resignation.

A suggested memorandum is attached hereto for the Attorney General. It would appear desirable, if possible, for the Bureau to stay out of this situation and I think we should try to keep it on a level between the Attorney General and the Senators.

I am attaching herete a copy of a letter addressed to me today by Senator Ball of Minnesota in which a request is made for information contained in the Bureau files concerning 11 individuals who were removed from the State Department under the provisions of the McCarran Rider during the past summer. Mr. M. Maurice Joyce, of the Professional Staff of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, who presented Senator Ball's letter to the Bureau, indicated that Senator Ball and Senator Bridges contemplated helding public hearings after the first of the year concerning the facts with reference to these 11 persons because of their disactiofaction with the fact that after discharge by the State Department, the 11 individuals were allowed the privilege of resignation without prejudice.

Mr. Joyce was asked to advise Senator Ball that the Bureau, as a subordinate unit of the Department, does not deal direct with Congressional committees or furnish information in its files except through your office. He was asked to inform Senator Ball that this request would be brought to your attention in order that you night give it appropriate consideration.

Wr. Joyce indicated that although the Senate committee investigators had reviewed the files of the State Department, there were indications therein that the files of the FBI contained information in addition to that which was available to the investigators through the State Department files. It was further explained that under a system of administrative handling within the State Department, it appeared that some naterial probably furnished by the FBI to the State Department was not incorporated in the general files of that department.

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




About this time. HIROLD HISELD Steeped in establishing contacts with MAYNE through the medium of JOHN HIM SHALL professional undercover investigator who has been mentioned earlier in this report. It appears that HEISBERG was associated with one CARNEDY HENSON and that they were endeavoring to discredit the Dies Committee by claiming that it was giving too much attention to Communists and not enough attention to opposing groups.

WEISBERG paid MAYNE to proper some material for the purpose of discrediting PELLEY and finally purchased some letters on which MAYNE had forged PELLEY's signature. These letters indicated that PELLEY and Congressman MARTIN DIES were friendly and that Congressman DIES was endeavoring to shield PELLEY. WEISBERG delivered these letters to Congressman FRANK E. It appears that WEISBERG paid HAYNE a total of approximately \$107.00 for the letters and for his assistance. It was indicated that WEISBERG doubtless suspected and may have known that the letters were forgories but the tangible evidence to prove this point was lacking. Although only 5 per cent of the population of the United States is Jewish, 60 per cent of the ten State Department aides dismissed for suspected disloyalty (Communists) bear lewish names: Irving Coldman, Hannah Goldman, Florence Levy, Bernard-Nortman, Alexander Lesser and Harold We is berg (Washington Times-Herald, September 21, 1947.) The remainder may also have been Jews since many Jews have been concealing their identity behind old Gentile names.

As everyone knows the Congressional Committee for the Investigation of Un-American Activities has done some of the most important work in the United States to expose Communist infiltration into our government. When the continuation of this vital Committee came up before Congress, every Jew in Congress voted to discontinue the Committee on Un-American Activities. The record is available for everyone to see in the Congressional Record of May 17, 1946.

Fensterwald appeared as a guest on a radio program & "Sunday Dialogue" featured by radio station WAVA 1/12/69. This was a two-hour show. The first hour Fensterwald was interviewed by the narrator regarding the purpose of the National Committee to Investigate Assassinations and the second hour was answering questions telephonically from the inquiring public.

Fensterwald stated that the Warren Commission report is a "fairy story" and that it is false and one of the biggest "snow jobs" ever done. He said the Committee's office will be located at 927 15th Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C., litelephone number 347-3837.

Fensterwald mentioned at present he has no staff but does have a Board of Directors which include Jim Garrison, New Orleans District Attorney, William Turner, former FBI Agent Fred J. Cook, Paris Flammonde, author and others. He hopes to build an investigative staff through funds obtained from private sources and donations. Thereafter, the staff will conduct necessary investigation into the assassinations of President John Fitzgerald Kennedy, Martin Luther King, and Robert F. Kennedy.

Fensterwald intends to link forces with various ipdividuals around the country namely Jim Garrison, Harold Weisberg, Josiah Thompson and others to form an organization so that a large pool of information relating to the assassinations will be available.

When this information becomes available, it is Fensterwald's intention to force, persuade or embarrass the Government to appoint a new Commission or for Congress to reopen the investigation concerning the assassination of FEB 6 1960 guel with him REC-20 6 President Kennedy. He contends the truth will come out

Fensterwald stated he believed there was a definite conspiracy involved in the assassination of President Kennedy and that there was more than one assassin involved. He indicated he doubts very much the Warren Commission's statement that there was no conspiracy involved in the assassination of President Kennedy. Fensterwald wants to have the photographs of President Kennedy's autopsy, currently in the Archives, made available as he believes with others of the group with whom he has become aligned, that shots which were responsible for President Kennedy's death came from the front, rather than from the rear.

associated with Senator Long's committee on wire tapping and had been involved in investigating the Internal Revenue Service and the Department of Justice. He was asked by the narrator if he intended to investigate the FBI. Fensterwald said he was not "doing an investigation of the FBI as such," however, will have the advantage of having William Turner on the Board of Directors as well as Fred J. Cook, who are knowledgeable about the activities of the FBI and other Government agencies. Fensterwald mentioned Paris Flammonde, whom he described as an author who recently wrote the book "Why President Kennedy Was Killed." Flammonde takes the position in this book that there was a conspiracy involved and analyzes the possibilities of who were involved.

Comments made by Fensterwald regarding the investigation of President Kennedy conducted by the Warren Commission readily revealed that he was not familiar with the full facts or the information contained in the Commission's report. Further he has aligned himself with individuals whom we know to be severe critics of the Warren Commission, the FBI, the CIA and other Government agencies.

He indicated another purpose he has is "to restore some sense of integrity to our Government," as an unsolved murder of a President casts doubt on the Government. Therefore, he will make efforts to bring an honest investigation "by our Government" into the assassination of President Kennedy.

From comments made by Fensterwald and because of the known background of the individuals with whom he is associating, it can be anticipated this group will undoubtedly make unwarranted attacks against the FBI in the future.



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negotiations with one HARCID MISBERG and GARDNER JACKSCN, with a view to selling all of his accumulated correspondence with the Silver Shirt Legion of America for a sum of money. The documents, however, did net include correspondence signed by WILLIAM DUDIET PRILY. Therefore, MAYNE conceived the idea of fabricating letters purporting to have been prepared by WILLIAM DUDIEY PRILY implicating members of the Dies Committee in a plan whereby the Silver Shirt Legion of America would not be investigated by the Dies Committee.

WEISBERG and JACKSON had been very active in opposing the activities of the Dies Committee. MAYNE exhibited the forged letters to WEISBERG and JACKSON, who offered him a sum of money in excess of \$100. These letters were later exposed on the floor of the House of Representatives as forgeries resulting in the prosecution and conviction of MAYNE on a charge of forgery and uttering, and also obtaining money under false pretenses.

MAYNE entered a plea of guilty to the indictments on January 27, 1941, and on February 12, 1941, received concurrent sentences of one year to three years. Execution of sentences was suspended and MAYNE was placed on probation until rebruary 12, 1944.
