

# Faces Indefinite Imprisonment

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Hobbs concentration camp bill, HR 3, may mean indefinite imprisonment for Harry Bridges.

Introduced by Representative Sam Hobbs, sponsor of the wire-tapping bill HR 3 would provide for detention of non-citizens whose deportation cannot be effected.

For example, if Harry Bridges were ordered deported, and Australia would not take him back, he would be put in a "detention"

camp. And he could be kept there indefinitely.

Write or wire your congressman urging him to oppose this bill. Ask him to have your communication inserted in the record of the hearings on the bill.

HR 3, which last year was defeated by popular opposition after it had passed the house, is now in the house judiciary committee. It was reported favorably as written by administration officials, its enactment requested by Attorney General Jackson, and then it was returned to the judiciary committee.

## Prosecutor Missing When Convenient

SAN FRANCISCO — Major Lemuel B. Schofield, chief of the U. S. immigration and naturalization service and actively engaged in the day by day prosecution activities, knows when to stay away from the Bridges hearing.

His chair was vacant the day James D. O'Neil testified that Schofield threatened to get his job with a radio station unless O'Neil would lie about Bridges.

"He told me that he had ways and means of assuring me that nothing would happen . . .", O'Neil said.
