League and Dies Argue
On Who Is Un-American

Charge of 'Communist Front'

Brings Sharp Reply
WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (A).—The
League for Peace and Democracy,
Washington branch, and the House
committee investigating un-American activities exchanged a hot
round of criticism today about who
was being "un-American."

When the committee convened, Representative Martin Dies Democrat, of Texas, whipped out a league statement adopted at a meeting here last night and read excepts. One of these alleged that the committee, through its past inquiries into the league, was seeking to "brand as un-American the progressive policies and the social objectives of the New Deal, which the American League supports."

Mr. Dies observed that this charge

Mr. Dies observed that this charge was just a reaction to the committee's assertion that the league was a "Communist-front organization."

The league, on the other hand, reported that committee agents recently had "raided" its offices looking for membership records and said this was using "un-American tactics."

Mr. Dies indicated that what the committee was interested in was finding out government employees who belonged to the organization. He said many had carried their memberships for a long time despite the committee's warnings about the league being "dominated by the Communist party."

"The continuance by these government employees of their affiliations with Communist-front organizations." the chairman said. "and their attributing of ulterior metives to the committee raises to the chair's mind a serious view as to what the motives of these government employees are in continuing their affiliations with the Communist party."
