WASHIN\&TON, Dec. 1.-There was a signlificant bit of by-play Tuesday when the British Ambassador deposited a copy of the Magna Charta at the Library of Congress. In accepting qustodianship of this document, Archibald MacLeish, the librarian of Con aress, made a statement deliberately addressed to the Dies committee on "un-American activities."

Mr. MacLeish said: "Governments by the people's representatives, like other governments, can be misled. Government by the people's representatives may, from tim to time, mistake for the defenders of the people's rights, the false defenders of the people's rights-the demagogues, the same in every gemera-

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tion, who appeal to liberty in order to destroy it.
"Government by the people's representatives may, from time to time, substitute inquisitions and espionage for the equal protection of the laws, and may permit the inquisitors, $n$ their reckless search for enemies of liberty, to break down liberty."
During the delivery of these "unAmerican" remarks, Chief Justice
Charles Evans Hughes of the Su. preme Court beamed and nodde a approval and afterward telephoned Mr. MacLeish to congratulate 1 im
on this passage.
Since the Supreme Court fight of 1937, the Chief Justice has been seeking to rehabilitate the tribunal in liberal opinion and his hospitable reception of the MacLeish ppeech is being interpreted by Nev/ Dealers as a broad hint to appeal from Mr. Dies and his fellow Red hunters to the protection of the colurts, which forbid persecution of citizens for reasons of conscience, color, religion, sex or opinion.
Mrs Roosevelt's bld coup-in inviting to lunch at tre White House members of the Youth Congress, being attacked for heresy, by the Dies Committee, gives added point to the Hughes-MadeLeish episode.

A Different zind of Inquiry
At the same tifne, the La Follette Senate Civil Liberties Committee is preparing to hold hearings in California. There the issue of isms and Read-baiting is most acute. Instead of using smear tactics, the Senate committee hos sent a picked corps of economic experts into California.
These experts, instead of attacking the status of the migratory workers of the moral basis of "right" and "wrong' or pillorying the Associdted Farmers, are trying to discove the real cause of California's a qrarian troubles and to indicate the real remedy-if there be a remedy.
Both committees-the Dies' Redhunt and the La Folleteté investiga-tion-will expire at the next Congress unless they get additional funds. Fpr this reason, serious consideration is being given to the proposal that both groups should be discontirfued and that a joint Congression 1 committee be appointed to inve ptigate "threats to democracy."

An Impartial Committee
Senafors La Follette of Wisconsin and Thomas of Utah would be on this $n$ low body, as well as Representative Dies-together with such aditional members from both houses of Congress as were needed to give it impartiality.

Some time ago, such a merger
was proposed, but that thatstime Mr . La Follette objected. Now/the funds of the Dies group are rymning low, and Mr. Dies himself if engaged in a public campaign for more money with which to condugt his unending quest for "radicals" and "Fascists."
Under these circumstances, some New Dealers hope that the whole operation of unpasking the domestic enemies of democracy may be combined and made responsible. . Adolf/I on Way Out? .
