## PIEKERTON MATYONAL DETROTIVE AGENCY. INC.

Statement of Case, December 9, 1956.

The September hearing on Pinkerton brought out the following:

- (1) History, Corporate Structure, and financial status of Pinkerton.
  - (2) Policy and methods of operation.
  - (5) Mature and extent of industrial work.
- (4) Lucretive profits of agency and meager pay to informants.

Further exemination of the Agency will bring out:

- (1) Further development of nature and extent of labor espionage.
- (2) Failure of agency to furnish material requested by Committee.
  - (5) The shattered "high ethical standard" of the agency.
  - (4) The trading of labor information to employers.
- (5) Deceptive methods used by a Superintendent in dealing with informants.
  - (6) Perjury on the part of a Superintendent.

The first five witnesses will develop further the agency's labor activities and identify material for record.

G.M. Read - Pittsburgh Superintendent
He will be called upon to explaint (a) Why the
operatives reported on the activities of John Lewis,
and the G.I.O. in the steel industry. Excerpts of
reports on such activities will be read aloud; (b) A
report about a workers' petition for a secting and
the attendance of this secting by the operative;
(c) A report in which operative suggests the climination
of a worker who favored organisation. TIME 15 Min.

R.L. Burnaide - Asst. Supt. Detroit (Alias R.L. Brumswick)

This witness buys information from informents and will be questioned about these contacts. He will also be asked to emplain two Journals handled by his which call for the investigation of Irregularities and Thefts, but operative reports on these operations describe union activities, a strike, picketing, and one of them contains a suggestion by operative to eliminate three strike leaders in order to effect a settlement with workers.

Excerpts of reports will be read aloud.

Operative reports and receipts from informants will be offered as embildts. TIME 15 Min.

G. G. Hunt - A set. Supt. Philadelphia
This witness will be questioned on the union setivities of
the informate from whom he buys information. He will be
asked to explain why operatives reported on the G.I.F.
organizational activities and the radio talks of Steel
Workers Organizational Countities organizates.

Excerpts of reports will be read aloud.

Operative reports and receipts from informants will be offered as exhibits. TIME 15 Win.

Print Abell - New York City (alies F.L. Adems)
Contests informants and pays them. This witness
will tell: (a) New he makes contacts with new
informants; (b) Why operatives reported on union
activities in Pennsylvania Reilroad; (c) Why
operatives reported on agitators and organisational
activities of workers when operation called for
suspected thefts which were not mantioned at all in
reports.

Excerpts of reports will be read aloud.

Operative reports and receipts from informants will be offered as exhibits. TIME 15 Min.

The next witnesses will bet

Robert A . Finkerton-Fresident of Agency Asher Rossetter-----General Manager

is in the September hearing, those two witnesses will be examined jointly so that either may ensure questions put to them. They will first be called upon to account for the failure to furnish material requested by the Counities.

The witnesses will then he questioned intensively about the instructions given to operatives to discontinue writing reports at the time of the service of the subpeaus. After this a signed statement by operative Margett of Man Francisco will be read to show that he submitted reports regularly since the service of the subpeaus. This statement will also show that reports are being "cocked". (Difficulty with statement: Investigator promised not to expose him). A sample report dated Movember 1, 1986, with the operative's secret designation will be offered for record.

The witnesses will then be questioned about the pelicy of the agency as summisted in the Order Book. Farts of this material will be read and questions propounded to break down the high othical stendard the agency claims to have. The following points will be raised on this material: (a) Instructions on how to overcome United States Law forbidding officials to hire agency service. Canvassing reperis from St. Louis will be offered to show wide contacts with government officials); (b) Agency's unfavorable attitude toward the Estimate Labor Relations Act; (c) All labor matters are referred to as "Semministic Activities" in a letter by Ressetter; (d) Main office may permit deviations from agency rules. This multifles principles laid down in Order Book; (e) An Exhibit of Lake Brie Chantel Company indicates Agency used Dietograph which is contrary to claim in Order Book; (f) Investigated a marital relations case, which is contrary to rule in Order Book. Journal, brief eard and receipts evailable as evidence.

The witnesses will also be questioned about the use of gas explosives by Agency. An Exhibit of Lake Eric Chemical Company indicates agency bought gas explosives.

TIME One Hour (Tentatively)

The next witness will be:

San H. Brady - Supt. of Cincinnati (alias Bradley)
Voluntaous correspondence between Brady and two men
whom he hooked in 1880-81 will tell the story of his
activities as a "hooker". This material will show:
(a) That he pretended to be gathering labor information
for a socialogical organization headed by prominent
eitisons; (b) He advised operatives to obtain material on
their union, strikes, and teld them that labor trouble was
good for husiness; (s) He used compulsion on "hooked" men
to breaden acquainteness and pump friends. (Brady does not
know we possess this material).

He will be questioned so as to afford him every opportunity to lie.

Then the following witness will be called to prove Brady was lying:

Clerks, Cinetnesti, Unio
(Brady and Zeigler may be examined jointly)? This fourt
Zeigler will testify that he secured the correspondence
from Brady's two informants, Jones and Bralard. (These two
men have not yet been located). He will identify the letters,
many of which will be read aloud, and questions about their
contents will be directed to Brady. All correspondence
will be offered for the record.

Zeigler will be excused and Brady will be further examined on the following:

Brady will be confronted with several of his convaccing reports which show that he urged employers to hire agency's service for the purpose of apping on workers. A number of reports will be read aloud.

A Detroit Journal for General Motors and receipts from the operative on this operation will form the basis for questioning Brady about agency's activities for this concern.

TIME for Brady and Zeigler One Hour

Joseph Littlejohn - Supt., Atlanta
This witness testified in previous hearing. He will
now identify and tell about the activities of the
operatives registered with the police department in
Atlanta, and asked to explain why five operatives, now
employed in the Atlanta office, were not registered with
the police as required by the city ordinance.

In the last bearing he testified that only one operative was a member of a union. He will be confronted by three names of operatives who are members of a union. (Letter's statement).

Littlejchn will then be questioned about his activities as an under-cover man in a street car union in Nobile, Alebama. TIME 10 Min. (Tentatively)

He testified in the September hearing and is a friendly witness. He will be called again to fill in the gaps of this story as well as to give new facts. Letter will be questioned to bring out: (a) The number of operatives that were members of a union in Atlanta; (b) The clients he served which involved reporting union activity; (c) The number of workers dismissed because of union activity; (d) The effect of Finkerton labor spring on the unions; (e) The strikesbreaking activities of the agency; (f) The influence of the agency on the families of strikers.

The list of present and ex empratives of the itlanta office recently received from him will be used to refresh his memory on the activities of some operatives. TIME 10 Min.

L.T. Carr - Bowie, Maryland
This man is an ex-employee of Pinkerton. He worked as a guard and secret operative from 1918 to 1952. This witness will be questioned to bring out the points given in his unsigned statement which ere: (a) He was a member of a union and Finkerton reimbursed his union expenses; (b) He was an operative in the Dry Pock Strike and in the anticipated strike of Pampylvania Railread in 1921and 1922; (c) Workers were discharged on his recommendation; (d) He did divorce work for Pinkerton; (a) He was furnished with erms while not deputised.

The stemographic report is to be taken back to Carr for his signature. At present Carr is in Charlestown, West Virginia. It is likely that he has changed his mind about signing the statement. He is a valuable witness and should be immediately contacted for his signature and asked to serve as a witness. Should Carr become hostile to the Committee, he would nevertheless be a valuable witness. TIME 30 Min.

The hearing will then close with the presentation for the record of the following exhibits:

- (1) A Summary Table of information from journals, ledger sheets, and operative reports.
- (2) Canvassing Reports.
- (5) An additional list of Pinkerton clients.
- (4) A list of Pinkerton employees including secret operatives.

Heny important witnesses may yet some from the leads
furnished by L.L. Lettess. The list contains names
and addresses of employees and sa-employees of the
Finkerton Atlants office, some of which are members of
a union. A report on these leads from the Atlants
investigator is being saxiously swaited.

An operative of the Cincinnati office who reported on the Closure plant and suggested the "elimination" of three strike leaders in order to effect a settlement with strikers.
