In a letter dated 16 June 1968 from the Director NSA to Mr. Rankin, General Counsel, the Director stated regarding CE-111, "It is considered most unlikely that this process of letter removal has any cryptographic implication". It seems to me that Exhibit 111 is an example of a geometrical technique known as the Durning Grille Cipher.

The Grille cipher is a rather elementary technique and I fail to understand how it was that the cryptologist at NSA or their supervisors could not have been aware of this. Would you please inform me as to whether or not the Agency still maintains this position?

Dear Sir:

In December of 1967, I wrote to you to request information about several suspects associated with the Kennedy assassination of 22 November 1963. The regly to that letter is enclosed.

Since recieving your reply, I have visited the National Archives and had interviews with employees of both the Department of Justice and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Neither of these agencys had any futher information and a representaive of the F.B.I., informed me that his Bureau did not follow up on the investigations which were conducted by your police department. Also, there is no material on file in the National Archives which concerns these suspects.

It is not my intention or wish to embarass any innocent individuals through my inquiry. However, having seen photographs of some of these people while in custody, I thought it rather strange that there weren't any published reports other than the limited information available in the radio-logs. Could you furnish me with any futher information concerning these suspects?

The enclosures with this letter deal with a possible cryptographic aspect of the "Oswald Case". As a new member in the ACA, and an amateur in Cryptology, I was wondering if you of some of the membership might be interested in working on it.

The first set of documents deals with Commission Exhibit number 111 and seem to indicate that it may be an example of the Turning Grille Cipher technique. This paperback book was the property of Marina N. Oswald, Lee's wife.

The second set of copies concerns a letter which is said to have been written by Lee Harvey Oswald. The typed letter dated 6 January 1967 (author unknown) alludes to Harvey a hidden message in CE-15.

All of the material except for the anonymous letter of 6 January, is declassified and are to be found in the twenty-six volumes of the Warren Repert (Hearings Before the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy). If you feel that this matter is not suitable for publication in the Cryptogram, perhaps you could advise me of certain individuals who might be interested in doing futher research into the project.

Thank you for the materials and letter of Nov. 14.

We'd like to look at the material more carefully before venturing more than tentative opinions. However there are a few points you might be abple to clear up that occur to us at first glance.

The grille, if such it is, doesn't turn but stands or at most flips. Were thos the only pages with marks? Since most of the marked letters are not legible it's impossible to say, even if we had enough Russian to speculate on anagramming, whether or not there is any meaning. Perhaps you have more information on this or clearer copy.

Comerning the letter: there seems to be no source in the documents for the number clues given by "X". By"3 letters in Now." he might mean N O V as 1,2,3 The rest of that sentence makes no sense at all for the P.O.Box number is not 34567 but 6225. There is nothing to show how or why he"scrambled" 34567 to get 47365; similarly then 6225 becomes 2652 for no obvious reason. (Why not 67453 or some other arrangement)? BADC or BEADC defines the scheme but there is no source for it..again why not ADBC or ADEBC? One could as easily just anagram selected words from the text which is what he next does.

This sort of "deciphering" is common to those who suspect null messages everywhere. The true null shows itself normally without such manipulations. As an example of the sort of paths down which this type of speculation can lead as well as a criticism of them you might refer to William & Elizabeth Friedman's book "The Shakespearean Ciphers Examined". With such a short text and no system known to be used one can read any message one would like into such a letter. The message "X" seems to find is far too ambiguous for any rational system of communication. A prime rule of any communication is that there be no room for interpretation, esp. if there is possibility of a mechanical garble as there would be in a systematic null such as suggested he:

While this might be of historical interest if there were indeed messages, there is not enough internal evidence now to warrant publication in The Cryptogram. We'd be interested in any further work you do. However we can't promise it would be anything to interest the Krewe in general. We know of no one now who has expressed an interest in the subject so can suggest no one who might work on the project with you.

All in all, it doesn't look too promising, esp. since at least some gov't experts have already had a look at the whole array of documents, and have found nothing worth the bother. We are aware of criticisms of the Warren Report. At the same time one must leave open the possibility of deeper, less public investigation which has, as yet, turned up nothing publishable. If there were continuing work, relevant documents would probably not be public; the possibility of outsiders, esp. amateurs, contributing anything would be very small.

If you would like the materials returned, please let us know. Good solving.


