PAUL H. EGLI, Head of the Crystal Branch, Naval Research Laboratory, Washington, D. C. (WDC), advised that he resides at 25 Blackhawk Drive, Forest Heights, Maryland.

EGLI stated that approximately six years ago, in connection with his naval employment, he made monthly trips to Dallas, Texas. In this connection, he remembered an incident which he felt might be of interest to this Bureau. A former acquaintance, name not recalled, who was employed as a Chief Engineer at the Helicopter Division, Bell Aircraft Corporation, Dallas, Texas, mentioned the arrest of a local strip-tease dancer known as CANDY BARR for possession of narcotics. According to this acquaintance, a group of prominent local Dallas businessmen known as the Inside-Cown Club, as a joke, provided legal counsel for BARR. BARR, at the time of arrest, reportedly was engaged in her nightclub act and was accused of having narcotics on her person. The members of the club thought this to be extremely humorous and alleged that the charge was ridiculous because BARR's scant attire at the time afforded no place to hide the narcotics. This acquaintance stated that this club had a building in Dallas and at the time, maintained the American flag in front of same at half-mast as a part of this joke.

EGLI stated that this acquaintance took him to dinner at a nightclub where he described the manager of same as being the booking agent for BARR. He recalled that this manager stopped at their table briefly to inquire whether their meal was satisfactory, and although very uncertain, believed he introduced himself as JACK DUFFY.

EGLI could recall very little descriptive data concerning the manager other than his having been a heavy-set, rough-talking, hoodlum type. He was certain that he would not be able to identify this manager from a photograph at this time.

On the night of the night club, he recalled that it had been located in the block located directly opposite the Adolphers Hotel in Dallas. He is very familiar with this area and believes that the club may have been located in the same building where the Carousel Club is presently situated.

EGLE stated that approximately a month after this incident on another trip to Dallas, this former acquaintance informed him that the members of the Uptown Club had a list with names of all the members of the "Club", and as far as he could determine, the only individual on the list whose name he recalled had since learned that "Alvin" was a card-carrying member of the Communist Party and narcotics distributor.

EGLE stated that he has tried for days to remember the name of this former acquaintance but has been unable to do so. He has no other contact with this individual and does not have any correspondence in his possession which might assist him in identifying this acquaintance is no longer residing or employed in Dallas. He last saw this acquaintance about two years ago when passing through WDC at which time, he told EGLE he had changed jobs and left Dallas.

EGLE admitted that he was a formerly vague and unimpressive individual who had been involved in the Dallas office of the Bureau of Investigation. He has been cleared of the charges against him and is presently unemployed. He is a local press and radio columnist. EGLE stated that he had been at the incident to which he was referring and that he had seen JACK WALKER at that time.
