

Post 10/21/71 Maryland Seen Adding To Rap Brown Charges

BALTIMORE Oct. 21 (AP) —Francis B. Burch, Maryland attorney general, said he and William B. Yates II, Dorchester County state's attorney who had H. Rap Brown indicted originally for arson and riot, may charge Brown with additional criminal counts.

Burch said late Wednesday he will meet with Yates in Cambridge within two weeks to discuss the matter.

The new charges, Burch said, could stem from Brown's jumping bail when he refused to appear for his trial in Howard County in April, 1970.

Burch said he "may also have Brown re-indicted for counseling to burn," a part of one count in the indictment against Brown. Howard County Circuit Court Judge James Macgill threw that part of the arson count out, however, "on a legal technicality," Burch said.

Burch has not indicated if or when he will seek extradition of Brown from New York, where the black militant was arrested Saturday after a shootout with police.

Yates had Brown indicted initially on charges of arson, riot and inciting to riot following the July, 1967, racial disor-

ders in Cambridge, on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

Wednesday, a two-judge panel found Richard Kinlein, Howard County state's attorney and a prosecutor in the Brown case, guilty of contempt of court for remarks he made publicly about the case in violation of a court order.

Kinlein, who termed the arson charge "fabricated," was fined \$350 and \$254.00 in court costs. He says he intends to appeal.
