W. Lloyd George Dies, CIA Official

W. Lloyd George, 74, a re-tired official of the Central In-telligence Agency, died Thurs-day at Northern Virginia Doctors Hospital after a long ill-

Mr. George was in the Navy during World War I, and in World War II he served with the Office of Strategic Services and was awarded the Bronze Star for his work in a mission into Bangkok.

Born in Wisconsin, he graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a journalism degree. Mr. George spent 12 years as a newsman before coming to Washington in 1934 to be editor-in-chief of publications for the National Resources Planning Board.

He served with the CIA from its creation in positions of broad responsibility. When he retired in 1967, he was awarded the Distinguished In telligence Medal for outstanding achievements as a pioneer in American intelligence and for contributions of major significance to the creation, structure, and functioning of the agency.

Mr. George was co-author of two books for boys, "Trains, Tracks and Travel," and "Grow Up to Fly."

He leaves as survivors his wife, Louise, of the home at 1544 33d St. NW, and a brother, David, of New York.
