The appointment of "people who don't agree with the idea of gathering intelligence in the first place" caused "extraordinary concern" at the White House and McCurdy's aggressive stance added to those worries, the official said.

Asked what the White House could do about the matter, the official said, "You can look at the underlying charter of what the committee was established to do and separate that from some of its practices today." Asked if that amounted to a threat that the White House would resist cooperating with the newly constituted committee, the official said, "We'll see."

Gingrich accused the new liberal appointees on the committee of not believing "in having an effective intelligence agency," and McCurdy of trying to pick "a public fight with the director of the Central Intelligence Agency in the middle of a war."

In his remarks at the press club,
