

Senators question CIA chief on murder plots

United Press International — WASHINGTON — William E. Colby, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, was questioned for three hours Wednesday by the Senate Intelligence Committee. Chairman Frank Church, D-Idaho, said the agency's involvement in assassination plots was a key topic.

Some have sought to link the CIA with President Kennedy's assassination.

Church said the committee received a full report on CIA covert activities. It was written by the agency's inspector general.

Earlier Wednesday, the House Select Committee on Intelligence completed preparations and announced it would soon begin a comprehensive investigation of U.S. intelligence activities.

Colby is to appear Friday before the panel. It will be his third testimony.

The house probe is the third investigation of the intelligence field this year.

A presidential commission headed by Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller is writing a report on its investigation of the CIA.

Chairman Lucien N. Nedzi, D-Mich., said the House committee would call Colby to testify later

this summer.

First, Nedzi said, the Bureau of Investigation, the CIA, the Federal Reserve, the Internal Revenue Service, the National Security Agency and other groups.

The House committee has seven Democratic

and three Republican members.

The Senate committee expects to call other witnesses in July.

"There's no doubt that some of the activities have been against the law and needed to be stopped. Some very serious questions have been raised."

Church noted that Colby already had said publicly that the CIA was not involved in plots to kill foreign leaders.

"The public statement Colby made has been correct but not complete," Church said. He would not elaborate.
