CIA Fronts Paid Harvard \$456,000

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) — A Harvard University report shows 13 programs at the university received a total of \$456,000 in funds from its organizations acting as conduits for the General Intelligence Agency (CIA).

The report was made by Humphrey Doermann, assistant to Franklin L. Ford, dean of the faculty of arts and sciences.

Ford, who succeeded former presidential advisor McGeorge Bundy as dean, said no strings were attached to the funds.

The report said the funds were given to programs and to individual professors in the departments of psychology, Philosophy and social relations for research from 1960 to 1966.

The programs included the international seminar of the summer school. Henry A. Kissinger, executive director of the seminar, acknowledged receiving \$135,000.

Kissinger said he was unaware the CIA had given partial support to the seminar through private foundations, but added it had made no effort to influence the seminar's work.
