

'CIA Spy' *Post 5-11-68* Executed In Poland

WARSAW, May 10 (AP)—Jery Strawa, 49, convicted last December of spying for U.S. intelligence, was executed today, the Polish Press Agency reported.

Strawa, an employe of the Polish foreign trade organization, was accused of passing military and economic information on Poland during his frequent trips to West Germany and Austria.

Passing the sentence, the presiding judge said Strawa had worked as a spy for three years "showing eagerness for material profit" while, like other Poles faced with a similar situation, he could have refused to cooperate.

In another development, six Warsaw University colleges, closed by the government March 30 after a series of anti-regime student demonstrations, reopened for classes today, the news agency reported.

The agency said only 73 students of 1616 expelled from the six faculties were refused readmission. But it added: "Probably many of them will finally be reinstated after renewed application." The agency said some of the 73 were the "instigators and organizers" of the demonstrations.

Courses will continue until the end of June, a month longer than originally scheduled.
